MOAA Central Florida Chapter Celebration JROTC Scholarship Program

The success of the Cadet of the Year scholarship program depends upon nominations of deserving cadets by the senior JROTC instructor at one of the 37 high schools in Orange, Osceola and Seminole counties with JROTC detachments. The nominations are accompanied by a written recommendation from the nominating senior instructor. Each cadet nominated is interviewed in dress uniform by a diverse selection committee composed of three retired officers who are members of the Chapter. The interviews last approximately 15-20 minutes. Factors considered by the selection committee include but are not limited to: military bearing and appearance in uniform, cadet JROTC assignments, Advanced Placement

and Honors classes taken or completed, GPA, school activities, service in the community and plans for future military service.

Three of us spend two Saturdays interviewing the top two senior cadets that the cadre instructors select from each school. On average we end up interviewing about 25-30 cadets. The competition is fierce, and we usually select the top 8-10 cadets based on our donations from our members (each cadet is awarded \$1,000). Our JROTC luncheon is a favorite luncheon event as it's an opportunity to showcase our future military leaders and recognize them with the generous financial donations from our chapter members for their achievements. It's also an opportunity to show our gratitude to the cadre instructors and family members.

The Chapter believes the cadets benefit from the interviewing process whether they win a scholarship because they will be interviewing for positions throughout their lives. It was a privilege to share in the exciting achievements of not only what the cadets have accomplished in High School, but we shared in the excitement that two received Service Academy

Appointments, and some qualified for ROTC Scholarships, and one is enlisting in the Coast Guard! Each year I think I can't be more impressed with our selection of cadets, and each year I hear and see more potential for military service in the cadets we selected. On behalf of all three selection board members, I want to thank the hard-working Cadre Instructors who take their job seriously to train and mold our future leaders, and the family members who help guide and support their children who in many cases want to follow in their footsteps and serve our country. Job well-done Cadets!

Cadet Lorena Kovac is a senior at Timber Creek High School and a dedicated four-year member of AFJROTC. During this time she has been active throughout the unit serving as Deputy Group Commander. Her future plans are after graduation are to serve in the United States Air Force, commissioning through ROTC or possibly enlisting.

Cadet Haley Sanchez has been a part of JROTC at Timber Creek High School for four years holding many different positions including Drill Team Commander and for the 24-25 School year, Group Commander. She plans on continuing her involvement in ROTC in college while attending the University of South Florida. "My passion is medicine; I plan to become a doctor in the U.S. Air Force and hope to be part of an Expeditionary Medical Support team, providing life-saving care in deployed environments."

Cadet Antonio Torre, of West Orange High School, says, "Ever since I was a boy, I aspired to be the man who stands in the gap for what matters most. My purpose is to lead others with a servant's heart and live a life committed to duty, honor, and country. I am honored to receive this scholarship from our previous leaders to help equip the next. Your contributions to our country and sowing seeds into the future will better equip me to be commissioned as an infantry officer and, eventually, a Green Beret officer who will be a competent combat leader who leads by example." Cadet Torre has been selected as a member of the Class of 2029, U.S. Military Academy at West Point where he plans on majoring in War Studies.

Cadet Colonel Ethan Kirtley is the Apopka JROTC Battalion Commanding Officer. He has been the Armed Regulation drill team Commander for the past two years. He is also a Chief in the Sea Cadets. Ethan is very active in Apopka's National Honor Society and the community. Ethan is set to join the United States Coast Guard after graduation.

Cadet Colonel Magnuson Kallin is a student at Seminole High School in Sanford Florida and the Corp Commander of AFJROTC Unit FL-872. He is a 4th Year cadet who holds the rank of Cadet Colonel leading a Cadet Wing of 257 cadets on 2 campuses. He has earned the Distinguished Cadet Award and the Air Force Association Award. He recently led his unit to an "Exceeds Standards" during our Headquarters inspection. In the summer of 2024, he was awarded the AFJROTC Flight Academy Scholarship, an intense 8-week program where he completed his Private Pilot's License. Cadet Kallin has a 3.8 GPA and has accumulated over 230 community service hours in AFJROTC alone. During his 4 years in AFJROTC he has been a member of the Raiders Physical Fitness Team, Captain of the Marksmanship Team, Joint Leadership Academic Bowl (JLAB) and the Color Guard. He is also a member of the schools Leadership Team. In March he earned an NROTC 4-year Scholarship and hopes to attend NROTC at Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University.

Cadet Colonel Fiona Ferrero is a native of France and has lived here for about seven years. She is a dedicated member of the Ocoee HS FL-20064 Air Force Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (AFJROTC). She demonstrated leadership and service through involvement in Key Club and public service work with Senator Marco Rubio's office, assisting in legislative research and community outreach. Currently, she serves as the Deputy Group Commander in her JROTC Unit, where she actively contribute to mentorship, training, and unit operations. "I am committed to making a lasting impact through service, discipline, and excellence."

Cadet David Glen Peebles, of West Orange High School, says, "My dream is to serve others before myself and defend our nation with the same excellence as the remarkable men and women who

came before me. I am incredibly grateful to the generous donors of the MOAA Scholarship Fund for their support. 

1. Email your legislators with a MOAA-suggested message.

Visit <u>takeaction.moaa.org</u> to find pre-written emails outlining MOAA's advocacy positions. Enter your ZIP code, and they'll be delivered right to your senators and representative. Some members ask us whether these pre-written messages are effective; our experience says yes. Legislative staffers know a constituent who takes the time to send a message is one who will vote in November.

2. Make a phone call.

Call (866) 272-MOAA (6622), MOAA's toll-free line to the U.S. Capitol switchboard, to be connected with your legislators' offices. Congressional staff members track constituent calls, and elected officials pay close attention. You can find talking points at takeaction.moaa.org.

The site identifies there are 30 Florida VVA Chapters, and the state has 6,003 members and 883 Auxiliary members. The National VVA website is www.vva.org. Please help recruit fellow Floridian Vietnam Veterans in Florida and lets kick New York to the number 2 slot in the Nation for Vietnam Veterans!!!!

At a recent VVA Florida State Council in Lake Mary I had the good fortune of hearing and meeting the National President of VVA Jack McManus. He sums up exactly why veterans like me that have come after Vietnam Veterans owe a debt of gratitude we could never repay: "We have changed the way veterans are treated by our country. If those changes, especially the respect and dignity for sacrificing in service to the nation, are to be forever, then the vestiges of the VVA spirit must endure. I really believe that VVA has a future. That future will continue after we move on down our own lifetime's road. It is that intangible thing in the hearts and souls of every proud VVA and AVVA member. It's our VVA spirit."

Military Spouse Appreciation Day May 9th 2025

National Military Spouse Appreciation Day is a presidentially approved holiday and is celebrated on the Friday before Mother's Day in May. This year it will be observed on Saturday, May 9th, 2025. "A man travels the world over in search of what he needs and

<u>May is Military Appreciation Month</u>, a time to pause and reflect on the service and sacrifice of those who have served our country. Military Appreciation Month is also a time to acknowledge those who serve alongside veterans. The spouses, partners, and children of service members carry the weight of long absences, emotional distance, and silent struggles. Caring for the whole family is how we truly honor their service

The Children of Fallen Patriots Day on May 13th salutes the sacrifice of military children who have lost a parent in the service to our country. This day helps to raise awareness of the sacrifices and struggles children must endure in the wake of their parents' death. The numbers are staggering and in the past 25 years, more than 15,000 children have lost parents in military conflict. This date reminds us to applaud their resilience and strength and show appreciation for the young people whose lives were forever changed. May 13th was selected as the date of observance due to being the day Arlington National Cemetery was established in 1864. Note: Beginning May 7, 2025, individuals over the age of 18 who enter Arlington National Cemetery in a vehicle should be prepared to present a REAL ID at the security check point.

What is Memorial Day and why do we honor it?

The origins of the holiday can be traced back to local observances for soldiers with neglected gravesites during the Civil War.

The first observance of what would become Memorial Day, some historians think, took place in Charleston, S.C., at the site of a horse racing track that Confederates had turned into a prison holding Union prisoners. Blacks in the city organized a burial of deceased Union prisoners and built a fence around the site, Yale historian David Blight wrote in The New York Times in 2011.



Then on May 1, 1865, they held an event there including a parade – Blacks who fought in the Civil War participated – spiritual readings and songs, and picnicking. A commemorative marker was erected there in 2010.

One of the first Decoration Days was held in Columbus, Mississippi, on April 25, 1866, by women who decorated graves of Confederate soldiers who perished in the battle at Shiloh with flowers.

On May 5, 1868, three years after the end of the Civil War, the tradition of placing flowers on veterans' graves was continued by the establishment of Decoration Day by an organization of Union veterans, the Grand Army of the Republic.

General Ulysses S. Grant presided over the first large observance, a crowd of about 5,000 people, at Arlington National Cemetery in Virginia on May 30, 1873. The orphaned children of soldiers and sailors killed during the war placed flowers and small American flags atop both Union and Confederate graves throughout the entire cemetery. This tradition continues to thrive in cemeteries of all sizes across the country.

Until World War I, Civil War soldiers were solely honored on this holiday. Now, all Americans who've served are observed.

What REAL ID Rules Mean for Military-Connected Travelers

All DoD-issued identification – to include IDs with indefinite expiration dates – will remain valid for airline travel after new REAL ID compliance rules take effect May 7, Transportation Security Administration (TSA) officials confirmed with MOAA.

DoD IDs, including those issued to dependents, are <u>on the official TSA list of acceptable identification</u> "and will still be an acceptable form of ID following the implementation of REAL ID," an official said via email. VA-issued <u>Veteran Health Identification Cards</u> (VHICs) are also on the approved list.

MOAA has fielded concerns from members who have encountered long delays or other challenges when using DoD-issued IDs at airports. Military.com first reported on issues faced by holders of IDs with "INDEF" expiration dates in 2024; at the time, TSA reportedly was considering removing "INDEF" IDs from the approved list because of issues with screening technology.

Asked what a military-connected traveler should do if their ID card is rejected, a TSA spokesman told MOAA via email that "[a] military ID should not be rejected, as it's an acceptable form of ID. If this does happen, they should ask for a Supervisory Transportation Security Officer (STSO)."
